RULES and REGULATIONS

Please see the Palmerston & Waihemo A&P Assn. Inc. Rules and Regulations, and those Rules of the Royal Agricultural Society under which this Show operates. These are found after the Equestrian section.

PROTESTS AND OBJECTIONS (All animals except Dairy Cattle)

- The determination of a judge shall be final as between all competitors, unless an objection is made to any exhibit and allowed on the ground of disqualification.
- The duly appointed member of the Committee, along with the Chief Stewards shall have, at their discretion, power to decide any dispute in their respective divisions after consultation with the Senior Stewards of the section involved, with the exception of regular protest and appeals.
- All objections or protest must be made in writing within one hour of judging
 of the class in question, signed by the person making such complaint, and
 delivered to the Secretary. No protest will be received later than one hour
 after the completion of the judging.
- The objector shall, at the time of making such objection, lodge the sum of \$50.00 which shall be refunded should the objection or protest be sustained.
- Protests will be received without deposit from Judges only.
- If the protest is lodged prior to Judging, the onus of proof will rest with the
 exhibitor. If the judging has already commenced, the onus of proof will be
 with the party protesting.
- All protests will be decided as soon as practicable and the decision made shall be final.
- If a prize-winner were afterwards disqualified, the Committee may, with or
 without the advice of the judge, decide whether the next animal on the list shall
 gain the prize.

DIVISION A TEXTILE CRAFTS, HANDCRAFTS, JEWELLERY

No exhibits from previous A&P shows, please. Beginner entrant is someone who has only been learning the craft for one year. Unless otherwise stated any ply or yarn may be used in any class.

SECTION A/1 KNITTING

Hints for exhibitors:

- Suitability of yarn to pattern
- Choose yarn carefully better quality yarn gives a better result.
- Correct needles for thickness of yarn to keep an even tension throughout the garment or article.
- Cast on edges should be even not too tight or too loose.
- Do not have knots in rows.
- Fair Isle do not carry wool across the back of work too far.
 Twist wool every second stitch.
- Neckbands must be flexible to slip over the head comfortably.
- When sewing up all seams should be flat and not pulled tight.
- Buttonholes must be evenly spaced.
- Always sew on buttons using the same yarn.
- All seams at cast on edge must be even.
- Pressing or blocking be advised by the label on the yarn.
- Loose ends/threads must be removed.

- 701 Knitted baby garment
- 702 Knitted baby's shawl
- 703 Knitted child's garment
- 704 Knitted adult's garment

SECTION A/3 SEWING

Hints for exhibitors:

Needlework

- Even weave fabric with thread to suit.
- Must not be pulled i.e., stitch must be square.

Patchwork

- Piecing should lie flat.
- Threads should be neatly and securely fastened.

Sewing

- Neat even seams and darts.
- Overlocking is acceptable.
- Trim selvages off all fabrics.
- Use of polyester thread is advisable.
- Use the same stitch length throughout the garment or article.
- No loose threads or ties. Knot them and trim excess off.
- Zip plackets must be flat and the zip slides easily.
- Match all stripes and patterns.
- All garments must be cut on the correct grain of fabric.
- Do not over-press.
- For machine made garment/articles hand finishing or sewing is allowed.
- 722 Sewn baby outfit
- 723 Sewn child's garment
- 724 Sewn adult's garment
- 725 Patchwork cot quilt
- 726 Sewn cosplay or steampunk outfit

- 727 Cushion cover
- 728 Any patchwork or appliqué item
- 729 Repurposed sewn garment from recycled materials

Cosplay Costume, with accessories and presented on a coat hanger, mannequin, or similar.

Hand spun — Presentation

- Present wool in a skein ends tied together and twisted.
- Evenly spun and plied unless otherwise stated.
- Wool must suit the use of the garment i.e. soft wool for children, medium wool for jerseys, etc., coarse wool for rugs.
- The twist and fibre should be even throughout the skein.
- See knitting and crochet sections for further hints.

Weaving

- Weaving should be firm
- Should lie flat
- Colours and patterns in proportion
- Even beat and tension
- Neat finishing
- 736 Hand spun and plied hank of Sheep wool (any breed)
- 737 Hand spun and plied hank of Alpaca wool
- Hand spun, plied and dyed hank of yarn

- 739 Hand spun knitted or crocheted item (any ply, any size)
- Hand spun and dyed knitted or crocheted item

DIVSION B BAKING/HANDMADE BREAD/CAKES/PIES

Hints for exhibitors:

- Exhibits may be cut for judging.
- Please provide a plain white plate for display of your baking and one that will fit inside your airtight container. Please name the plate and container.
- Be completely conversant with Schedule i.e. number of items.
- Presentation is important.
- Rack marks on cakes are not acceptable.
- Icing sugar sprinkled or dusted on entries is not acceptable, unless stated.
- Where the Schedule states iced cake plain and even icing is required.

• When a number of items is stated – all should be uniform in size, shape and colour.

Pikelets

May be round or oval shaped. Golden brown colour and breaks easily when folded.

Loaves

Fruit loaves should not contain nuts. Loaves must be well risen.

Cup Cakes

Tops should be rounded; cakes in paper cases and iced.

Fruit Cakes

Well risen with a flat smooth surface. Fruit evenly distributed.

Tin shape — round, or square with even sides and square corners.

Biscuits

Uniform size, colour, and crisp.

Shortbread

Either pricked or stamped; pale colour; fine even texture.

No bread-making machines to be used.

Hints for exhibitors:

- Yeast products must not have other raising agents.
- Exterior a) Good even shaping
 - b) No cracks
 - c) Thin crust
 - d) Well risen
- Interior a) Colour must be true according to type of bread
 - b) Moist and soft but not doughy
- 770 1 Loaf Wholegrain bread
- 1 Loaf Sourdough bread, any grain or flour
- 772 1 Loaf White bread

SECTION B/4 PIES with pastry crust, pastry to be handmade *Hints for exhibitors:*

- Classes 773 and 774 exhibit must have a bottom and top crust.
- Classes 775 and 776 exhibit may have a bottom crust only.
- Item presented out of the baking tin.
- Pastry must be evenly coloured top and bottom.

- 1 Meat pie with flavourings (not chicken pie, please)

CARROT CAKE

This recipe uses a food processor and cake mixer but these are not essential. Oven temperatures are a guide only.

Heat oven to 170°C fan bake or 180°C conventional bake.

Line a 20cm baking tin with baking paper.

- 2 medium carrots, grate in food processor change blade to chopping
- Drain and add 125g pineapple pieces and chop,
- Add ¼ C walnuts and chop

• Sift together: 1C plain flour 1 tsp cinnamon

½ tsp baking soda ½ tsp salt

1 tsp baking powder

- In a mixer beat 2 eggs and 1C sugar until thick.
- Add ¾ C salad oil (e.g. rice bran)

Fold in dry ingredients and add those in food processor and beat 1 min.

Put the mixture in tin and make a shallow depression in the centre. Bake approximately 30 min. Cooked mixture should have shrunk slightly from the edge of the tin and should not be making any "singing" noise (excess moisture has evaporated or been absorbed). Remove from the oven and allow to cool in tin for 5 minutes before removing and cooling on a cake rack. Best made the day before Show day.

Traditionally Carrot Cake is served with a cream cheese frosting but this is not required for judging. Please exhibit your entry without icing or frosting.



DIVISION C PRESERVES, BREWING, AND HONEY

Please label all jars and bottles with the date and name of the contents. Hints for exhibitors:

 Please ensure your entries have a removable lid because all entries will be opened.

Containers

- Jars for jam no smaller than 250gms.
- Jelly in jelly jars or tumbler i.e. straight sided jar.
- Clean jars are essential; sticky containers will be marked down.
- Jars must be labelled and dated.

Preserved Fruit

- Pint (500ml) or quart (1000ml) size jar or equivalent.
- Screw bands must be removed.
- Pack fruit neatly.
- No stalks, pips or stones.
- No sediment, discolouration or air bubbles.
- Liquid must cover the contents.

Jam

- Jam must be filled to top with no more than 5mm headspace.
- Jam should move but not run when jar is tilted.

Iellies

- Jellies must be clear.
- When a jar of jelly is tilted the jelly should bulge but not break.

Marmalade

Fruit must be sliced, not minced.

Pickle, Relish, Chutney, Sauces

- Sauce should be in a bottle.
- Relish, pickles, and chutney should be in an appropriate jar.
- Sealing wax may be used.
- Plastic screw cap with or without wax disc.
- Maturity all sauces, pickles, chutney and relish should be mature i.e. 6 weeks old.

Pickles A 10mm space between pickle and lid.

Fruit or vegetables should be movable.

Relish Well cooked ingredients, should still be identifiable.

Relish should flow.

Chutney Should be smooth – no skins, cores, stones or pips.

Sauce Must be smooth and pourable.

Bottle filled to within 10 mm of the top.


